History





The Academic Program

Administration

The Director of Education along with the Directors of Cycles and Heads of Departments, follows the Strategic Plan.

Governance

Vaad Hajinuj is the central organization of Jewish education in Chile, a non-profit whose work is to strategically support the management of the school.

Curriculum

The curriculum is governed by the Chilean national curriculum and enriched with additional subjects that add value to student learning.

Learning Support

All students are supported through the UAP (Pedagogical Support Unit) responsible for socioemotional and cognitive support.



Technology

The Department of Technology maintains a STEAM perspective in its teaching methodology. The objective is to integrate Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics. The Technology Department works collaboratively with other departments. ICTs (Information and Communication Technologies) communicate ideas and information in a clear and interactive way. In addition, IH has a robotics workshop that prepares students to participate in the National Lego League championship.



Arts, Athletics, & After School Activities



The Department of Music seeks to develop in the talmidim the taste and appreciation of music as a language capable of mobilizing emotions and ideas. Violin, clarinet, guitar, piano, keyboard, percussion, bass, ukulele, singing, and choir are some of the forms of musical experimentation that students choose to interpret a wide repertoire that includes popular and traditional Jewish music. Our students form rock bands, Klezmer groups, and participate in concerts and school plays to share and perfect their talents.

The Hebrew Institute develops four disciplines: soccer, handball, volleyball, and athletics (track and field), and although all students have the opportunity to play, each sport aspires to excellence and the maximum performance of its selected athletes. The sports that are practiced at the Hebrew Institute share the same objectives: to promote good use of free time and develop a healthy lifestyle, as well as to stimulate will, effort, responsibility, teamwork, perseverance, and personal improvement.



Academic Calendar

The school year begins at the beginning of March. The first semester lasts 19 to 20 weeks, followed by two weeks of winter break (July). The second semester generally lasts 19 to 20 weeks and ends in December for students and January for teachers.



Early Years

Alef to Kindergarten (children from 1.5 years old to 5 years old)



Lower School 1st to 3rd grade (ages 6 – 8)

This cycle is focused on the development of good habits, positive attitudes, and essential values that promote self-knowledge, empathy with others, healthy interpersonal relationships, and responsible decision-making. We encourage students to discover their own way of learning and provide classes that are self-sufficient, without the need to continue homework.



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Middle School

4th to 6th grade (ages 9 - 11)

Considering the uniqueness of each student, our school ensures that all students develop their maximum potential in a stimulating environment. Our school receives students from different socio- economic, cultural, and personal backgrounds and integrates them all into the same educational community. The school vision's promotes differences and provides tools to perform in an ever changing, globalized world.



Secondary School 7th to 4th (ages 12 – 17)

Secondary Education aims for students to develop reflective thinking from the systematic observation of reality, and to achieve a positive image of themselves for a balanced social life. During this last stage at IH, students acquire research methodologies that allow them to understand the environment they live in.

We promote the active, responsible, and critical insertion of students in society and in the Jewish community. Hebrew Institute graduates have a profile that is unique. They obtain the best results in academic and university exams, but above all, they are people committed to our traditions.





The Community

Students

At the Hebrew Institute we encourage the devotion and practice of Jewish traditions. Our students are knowledgeable about their history, that they are aware of Jewish and Middle Eastern news, maintaining a modern and plural vision of the significance of Judaism for their lives; and that they accept Hebrew as a language that belongs to them.

It is our purpose that our students become virtuous people guided by three fundamental values: Tikkún

Olam (the search for the improvement of the world and society), Arvut (solidarity and responsibility with others), and Tzedaká (social assistance as an expression of justice). It is these three values that



frame the most important activities carried out in school. Since 2014, the Torat Chaim program has helped us achieve these objectives through various actions that redefine the way of studying and experiencing Jewish sources. Torat Chaim has been distinguished with the "Rudy Pincus" Z"L award, in recognition of innovation in Jewish education.

Faculty

Our school has contemporary facilities equipped with the latest technology for our students' education. These include a sports campus with soccer fields and a track, a trilingual library with flexible spaces, science laboratories with state-of-the-art equipment and a synagogue.

Professional Development

IH recruits and hires the qualified and experienced teachers and offers ongoing professional development in all areas of pedagogy including teaching methodologies, assessment techniques, socio-emotional and physical health and well-being, etc.

Child Protection & Student Well-being

An UAP team (Pedagogical Support Unit) and skilled teams ensure a safe and protected environment for all students. The school is certified in the education and prevention of sexual abuse.

For years, a team of community leaders has been working on the "ATID Project."
